The Governor's Return: 3 October

Melbourne's first day of summer weather greeted the arrival of Governor and Mrs La Trobe back to their refurbished Cottage. The ceremony which was enacted on 3 October last year, the 170th Anniversary of La Trobe's arrival in Melbourne, was repeated, with the McCrae family, Captain Lonsdale, Collector of Customs Robert Webb, and the militia in attendance. The flag was raised as the National Anthem played, and Mr La Trobe then walked with his party to the Cottage where Martin Purslow, National Trust CEO, welcomed him back, pointing out the changes that have been taking place over the past year. It was timely that Mrs Georgiana McCrae was in attendance, as an olive tree, grown from a cutting from a tree originally grown by her at McCrae, was planted by the Governor. As last year, J P Fawkner led the welcoming crowd.



We are grateful to Justin Smith of Rippon Lea who provided an authentic characterisation of Mr La Trobe, Sharon Bowen and her team from McCrae (Mr and Mrs Andrew McCrae, and Mrs Thomas Anne Ward Cole), members of the Victorian Re-enactment Society, the Darebin City Brass Band and the Newport Bush Orchestra.

Thanks to all our members who helped with set-up, garden, teas, shop, reception duties and guiding in the Cottage. Dianne Reilly did a roaring trade at her tea stand. Cakes were donated by Woolworths South Yarra and Coles Melbourne CBD and South Melbourne. The guides, led by Lorraine Finlay, had a long and busy day in the Cottage, and the gardeners had ensured the garden was looking at its best. The pretty violas were kindly donated by Gills Nursery Cheltenham.

A small profit was made on the day through entry sales and donations, and this will be deposited in the National Trust Cottage Account. Funds in the Friends bank account will be topped up by John Drury's sale of books and Sandi Pullman's \$100 profit at her clivea stall.

Candlelit Carols at La Trobe's Cottage 21 December 2010, 7pm – 9pm

We are thrilled that the nationally renowned Trinity College Choir (University of Melbourne) will sing at our Christmas Event at the Cottage on Tuesday 21 December. Mrs Freier is working towards providing permanent furnishings for the house, and our donation will go towards that appeal.




Winter Visit. August: Toorak House
