She is interested in the lives of the La Trobe daughters and the samplers we hold – her thesis will be of great interest to us! Eremophila latrobei

Named by Ferdinand Mueller, who wrote in 1859:

'A noble species, well worthy of bearing the name of the excellent Charl. Jos. La Trobe, a great patron of Botany, and to whose love for science the botanical department under my administration owes its origin'.
