## Funded Works

Good progress has been made by builder Mark Lau in replacing rotting and damaged weather boards on the Storeroom/Kitchen Block. Mark has machined and installed replacement boards and is currently having the kitchen windows remade.

The recent hailstorm caused severe damage to the weather board edges, literally chipping off the existing paint. The west facing outbuilding was more affected than the Cottage and fortunately this occurred prior to re-painting.

Preparation and painting has now commenced and there is a great deal of gap filling required to seal and protect the boards from further weathering, damage and rotting. All of the surfaces are being power washed, sanded, filled and then three top coats will be applied. The most suitable paint to withstand our climate extremes has been chosen and has a 15 year UV rating guarantee.

## La Trobe's Garden

Some exciting things are about to happen in the garden. The Rippon Lea Heritage Apple group has generously subsidised our purchase of some heritage apples: two Pomme de Neige (pre 1800s) and two Ribston Pippin Yorkshire (1709). We are planning to plant them in front of the kitchen building, following the picture of Edward La Trobe Bateman (Botham, H., 2006, *La Trobe's Jolimont – a walk round my garden*, p.41).

Another exciting development is the donation from Jenny Happell of two Acacia acinaceae syn. Acacia latrobei Gold-dust Wattle. The gardening sub-group will plant them at our next working bee.

With the help of heritage rose expert Beryl Black, I am investigating what roses were available in La Trobe's time. I will keep you informed of what we choose and when we plant them.

Last night at La Trobe's birthday, the La Trobe Society held a raffle with some fantastic prizes. The Garden of Eden Nursery in Albert Park donated a beautiful camellia, Ferguson Plarre Bakehouses donated four apple pies and wine was donated by the La Trobe Society. \$300.00 was raised and the money will go towards purchasing the apples, roses and other plants for the garden. We are most grateful to the members of the La Trobe Society for their generosity.
